




- 1. A parade will be held on 4 May 1957.
- 2. Details for the Parade are as follows:
 - a. Reviewing Officer: General Curtis E. LeMay
 - b. Troop Commander: Lt. Colonel Miles J. Frisinger
 - c. Troop Adjutant: Captain Jack E. Montgomery
- d. The Reviewing Staff, consisting of the Command Section, Wing Adjutant, Directors of Personnel, Base Services, Operations, Comptroller, Materiel, and the Commander 3902d USAF Hospital, will report to the Reviewing Stand Area at 1025 hours and form under the command of the senior officer present.
- e. Unit Commanders will conduct a personal inspection of their units prior to 1000 hours.
- f. Adjutant's Call will be at 1030 hours. Elements will be in position on the ready line not later that 1025 hours.
- g. The uniform will be the blue uniform with blouse unless advised to the contrary.
















